Overview of the 30th MUBS Annual International Management Conference 2026

The Annual International Management Conference (AIMC) is one of the flagship events of Makerere University Business School (MUBS), held annually to provide a platform for scholars, practitioners, policymakers, students and other stakeholders to exchange knowledge and address contemporary business, management and development challenges. The 30th AIMC 2026, under the theme “The Knowledge Revolution: Driving Innovation and Sustainable Development in Africa,” showcases research, exhibitions, scholarly discussions and practical engagements on key issues critical to national and continental transformation. The conference provides opportunities for knowledge sharing, research collaboration, networking, innovation and the translation of research into policy and practice.

Day One – Tuesday, 22 September 2026:

The first day sets the tone for the conference through the official opening ceremony, featuring the keynote address by Associate Professor Ibrahim Mike Okumu and the Chief Guest, the Minister of Finance, Planning and Economic Development, Hon. Henry Musasizi. The day also provides a dedicated platform for emerging scholars through the Doctoral Colloquium, alongside research paper presentations. It therefore combines high-level reflections on the conference theme with mentorship, scholarly exchange and opportunities for doctoral researchers to receive feedback and strengthen their research.

Day Two – Wednesday, 23 September 2026:

The second day focuses strongly on knowledge generation and scholarly exchange, beginning with a keynote address by Professor Mush Sulaiman. The programme then moves into four parallel sessions, providing participants with opportunities to present and

discuss research across different areas of management, innovation and sustainable development. The parallel sessions are designed to facilitate deeper academic engagement, interdisciplinary dialogue and the development of potential research collaborations and networks.

Day Three – Thursday, 24 September 2026:

The third day broadens the conference dialogue through keynote addresses by Professor Andreas Brandner and Professor Tshediso Joseph Sekhampu, together with the NWU PhD Hub Session. Five parallel sessions in the afternoon provide an extensive platform for paper presentations and scholarly discussions. The day particularly emphasises international academic engagement, postgraduate research development, knowledge exchange and strengthening institutional and individual research networks.

Day Four – Friday, 25 September 2026:

The fourth and final day brings the conference to a close by connecting academic knowledge with practice, policy and national development. The day features a keynote address by Dr. Arinaitwe Rugyendo, with Ms. Olive Lumonya, MUBS Council Chairperson as Guests. This is followed by high-level panel discussions focusing on entrepreneurship; governance and inclusive development; knowledge management; and hospitality and tourism, providing a platform for practical insights, policy dialogue and cross-sector engagement. The conference concludes with a closing ceremony, officiated by the Chief Guest, the Speaker of Parliament of Uganda, Rt. Hon. Jacob Oboth Oboth, marking the culmination of four days of knowledge exchange, research dissemination, networking and collaboration.

REMARKS BY THE CONFERENCE CO-CHAIR



Knowledge Management as a Driver of Innovation, Transformation, Resilience, and Sustainable Development in Africa

The theme of “African Knowledge Revolution” for the 30th Annual International Management Conference (AIMC 2026) signals a call for a deliberate shift in how Africa positions itself in the global development narrative, from a

continent that primarily consumes knowledge produced elsewhere to one that generates, manages, utilizes and exports knowledge on its own terms.

This call for a knowledge revolution rests on three claims: 1) Knowledge is Africa’s most under-leveraged asset despite the continent holding vast indigenous knowledge systems for instance in agriculture, medicine, education, culture and heritage, biodiversity, minerals etc.

Having a young and rapidly digitizing population, and a growing base of scientific knowledge, researchers, educationists, technologists, leaders, managers and entrepreneurs yet much of these knowledge assets remain disconnected, undocumented, underutilized and externally validated before they are locally trusted. 2) A revolution, not an evolution.

The “African knowledge revolution” demands urgency and structural change to move knowledge management (KM) from a peripheral administrative function to a central strategic driver of how institutions,

governments, and firms operate. 3) Sovereignty over the knowledge value chain. The ambition for all Africans should be to own the knowledge value chain from data generation to storage, analysis, and application, rather than exporting raw data or talent and re-importing finished insights, models or technology. Thus, the theme of the 30th AIMC 2026 positions knowledge management not as a technical support function, but as the central driver of innovation, digital transformation, entrepreneurship, institutional resilience, inclusive and sustainable development across the continent.

To bridge the gap between theory and practice, the conference will in addition to the research and doctoral symposium, convene panels of experts and practitioners drawn from different sectors and institutions who will present concrete and verifiable cases where knowledge management has driven entrepreneurship, innovation, digital transformation, institutional resilience, inclusive and sustainable development in Africa. The discussion will focus on the specific knowledge-management mechanisms that made these cases work, and what it will take for African countries and institutions to move from episodic knowledge gains to systems that capture, validate, and scale knowledge on the continent’s own terms.

HARNESSING KNOWLEDGE LEADERSHIP, AND GOVERNANCE TO NAVIGATE UNCERTAINTY



As Makerere University Business School (MUBS) celebrates the milestone of its 30th Annual International Management Conference, hosted by the Faculty of Management, the global higher education and corporate landscapes stand at a critical crossroads. In an era defined by rapid technological disruption, economic volatility, and complex societal challenges, traditional

models of management are no longer sufficient. Sustainable success requires a paradigm shift rooted in knowledge leadership, robust governance, and deep institutional transformation.

At the heart of institutional transformation is knowledge leadership. The ability to create, absorb, disseminate, and ethically apply knowledge to drive strategic innovation. When knowledge leadership and effective governance converge, they ignite institutional transformation. This is not merely about incremental change or cosmetic restructuring, but a fundamental reimagining of an institution's purpose, processes, technology, people and culture. Therefore, to achieve meaningful societal transformation requires education and training institutions in Africa to modernize curricula and pedagogies by shifting toward competency-based education, experiential learning, digitalisation to streamline operations and expand access, and align institutional performance metrics with broader developmental goals such as the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals, Africa's Agenda 2063 and the respective national development goals.

As MUBS reflects on the three decades of developing skilled workforce, entrepreneurs and leaders, championing knowledge leadership and governance in driving institutional transformation and sustainable development becomes a key strategic goal. Thus, the track on "Knowledge Leadership, Governance and Institutional Transformation" in the 30th AIMC marks a milestone towards that goal. Makerere University Business School in collaboration with its stakeholders will continue to shape the future of the knowledge society in Africa and beyond.

Dr. Arinaitwe Rugyendo, PhD

Dr. Arinaitwe Rugyendo is the **Principal Press Secretary to the Speaker of the 12th Parliament of Uganda**, with 27 years of experience in journalism, media, academia, research communication and STEM education. He holds a PhD in Journalism and Communication from Makerere University, an MSc in Marketing from the University of Salford (UK), and other qualifications in mass communication and social sciences. His research interests include media transformation, research communication, artificial intelligence, implementation science and media viability. He is the founder and Editor-in-Chief of ResearchFinds News and founder of Young Engineers Uganda, a STEM initiative that has reached over 12,000 children and achieved international recognition in robotics competitions. He also serves as Board Chairman of the Uganda Premier League and Jada Coffee, and on the boards of NEMRA and CICD-Uganda. His leadership recognition includes being an Archbishop Desmond Tutu Leadership Fellow, Crans Montana Future Leader, and a 2024 UK Vitae ICE Award nominee for excellence in research communication.

Professor | Research Director - BRAC Institute of Governance and Development (BIGD)

Prof. Munshi Sulaiman is Professor and Research Director at the **BRAC Institute of Governance and Development (BIGD), BRAC University**. His research focuses on poverty, inequality, social protection, climate adaptation, and evidence-informed public policy, with particular expertise in experimental and quasi-experimental impact evaluation. Throughout a 25-year journey of research, professional practice, and continuous learning, he has led and contributed to large-scale randomized controlled trials and long-term panel studies, including pioneering research on the Graduation approach to reducing extreme poverty. His work has been published in leading academic journals and has informed the design and scaling of development programs in Bangladesh and East Africa. He earned his PhD from the London School of Economics and Political Science (LSE) and was a Postdoctoral Fellow at Yale University.



Prof. Andreas Brandner, PhD

Prof. Andreas Brandner is an Austrian Knowledge Management pioneer, Executive Director of the **Knowledge for Development Partnership**. At MUBS, he is Co-Founder and Director of the Knowledge for Development Center and an Adjunct Professor. Since 2001, he has led KMA Knowledge Management Associates and founded major initiatives including the Knowledge Management Academy and the K4DP School of Knowledge Sciences. He advises international organizations, governments, and development actors on KM and Knowledge-based Development. His work spans Europe, Africa, Asia, and America, and a wide range of sectors, including public management, agricultural development, finance, and biodiversity among others. He is also an author, educator, consultant, and advocate for AI-enabled knowledge management.

He is an Associate Researcher at the Economic Policy Research Center, the Centre for Dynamic Macroeconomic Analysis at the University of St Andrews, and the Centre for Basic Research in Kampala. His research focuses on economic growth and development, firm and household behaviour, public finance, corruption, and governance—areas central to evidence-based policymaking and sustainable development in Africa. Dr. Okumu has published extensively in leading journals, including the Review of Development Economics, Journal of International Development, Development Policy Review, European Journal of Development Research, African Development Review, and the South African Journal of Economics. He also serves as a reviewer for top journals such as World Development and the Journal of Economic Behavior and Organization. Dr. Okumu holds a PhD in Economics from the University of St Andrews (United Kingdom), an MA in Economics (Distinction) from McMaster University (Canada), and a BA in Economics (First Class Honours) from Makerere University.

He was appointed Honorary Professor at Linyi University, China, in 2013 and at Hong Kong Metropolitan University in 2019. Professor Kamoche is an internationally recognised scholar whose research has been published extensively in leading management and organisation studies journals. He is also the author of two books and co-editor of four others. His academic contributions have been recognised through several distinctions, including Academic of the Year 2011 by the Kenyan Community in Britain and the Outstanding Achievements in Education and Academia Award by the African Diaspora (UK) in 2013. In 2023, he was ranked among the world's top 2% of scientists in the Stanford University global rankings, placing him in the top 1.98% of scientists worldwide.

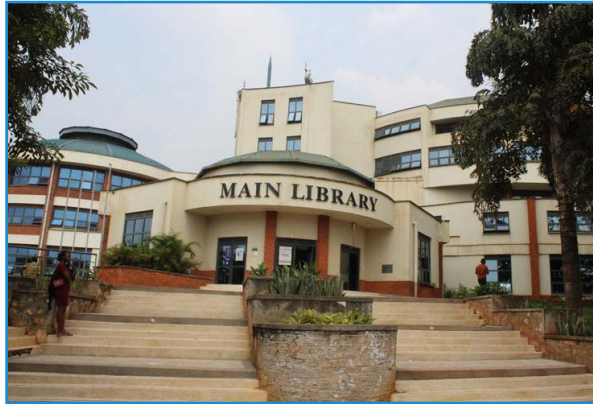
